
Posted Work and Precarity in the EU Ines Wagner (Cornell University Press, 2018)

Based on 30 interviews with posted workers and key actors in the German construction and slaughterhouse industry, Wagner contrasts the ideal EU policy world with lived experiences of posted work. A posted worker carries out work in another member state while maintaining a regular employment relationship in their home country.

There are more than 2 million posted workers in the EU.



The ideal EU policy world, where the posted workers have a certain set of rights, contrasts with reality.

many posted workers:

- Must accept any job, with no permanent employment
- Do not get their minimum rights enforced in the host state
- Are afraid to voice their rights, in fear of employer retaliation and unemployment
